What's In a Name?

Think about the weeks that 'parents-to-be' ponder on the issue of child-naming. .. and a lot of energy goes into it! Rightly so. Names are Important. Names tell us about those doing the naming and they say a lot about our expectations! I mean everyone knows about the song called, "A boy Named Sue"? The song was written by Shel Silverstein and made popular by Johnny Cash. Look at the consequences that came with that naming...

Naming is also about ownership. When we have ownership in the name we have more energy to give to it. A name gives meaning; gives identity and names function. The Book Group is immediately recognized as having something to do with reading and books; whereas the AMY building is not immediately recognizable - it needs more description. It's all about connections and communication.

So, you see it is all about the name...and it's all about a new name which describes the direction we are now traveling. It's about connections with each other; connections to our Methodist roots; connections to the larger church; and connections to the world. **



Mark Your Calendars for the 34th Annual South Bay and Peninsula CROP Hunger Walk on Saturday, April 3rd. Funds raised for CROP Walk will fight hunger, both in our local area through supporting Second Harvest Food Bank and Sacred Heart Community Service, and around the world with Church World Service. The walk will start at Hoover Middle School, 1635 Park Avenue, in San Jose at 1:30 p.m. There will be one and five mile options. Our Bay Area organizers have set the goal to be the largest CROP Walk on the West Coast! Let's make sure CUMC can make this happen.

If you are interested in getting a group together for CROP Walk, contact the Missions Commission (Charlie Slayman, 408-603-6276, cslayman@gmail.com) to help with organizing and advertising within CUMC. The group doesn't have to be limited to just CUMC members. Invite friends from outside the church. The more, the merrier! Let's get some friendly competition going to see which group can raise the most donations.

There will also be an informational rally on Saturday, February 12th at Second Harvest Food Bank at 750 Curtner Avenue, from 12 to 1 p.m. if you want to learn more on your own. A tour of the facility will take place at 1 p.m. There will be a separate

service opportunity to sort food that same morning, from 9 a.m. to noon. Check out http://shfb.org/home and click on "How to Help" to sign up for information on Second Harvest Food Bank.

Remember Second Harvest Food Bank

As this economic downturn drags on, many families that previously were getting by, increasingly are exhausting their savings and are having to turn to food banks for help in feeding their family. Within Santa Clara County we have the Second Harvest Food Bank that is a well organized and well run non-profit system delivering effective help to prevent families and especially children from going hungry. To minimize the time and travel of people using their service, Second Harvest has set up a large number of regional distribution sites in all areas of the county. Some of those are in community centers, some in churches and at other cooperating organizations. (Campbell UMC on Wednesday afternoons fills that role for the Campbell area.)

Many of us think well of the work being done by Second Harvest, but few of us are remembering to bring food to contribute to the system. The cans and packages brought in and left in our "market basket" get consolidated into the collection barrels in the Fellowship Hall and those are regularly picked up by a truck from Second Harvest. The non-perishable food contributed is

sorted at the main warehouse and then goes out daily along with fresh fruits and produce to the distribution programs such as the one held here weekly. For those who remember to bring in food, be assured it is going to good use.

Our Wednesday Wonder Workers (WWW) group sends a group once a month to help at the Second Harvest warehouse. In addition, the Church and Society Committee will send a group to help on Saturday, March 19th. Mark that date on your calendar and watch in February for your chance to sign-up for the limited number (15) of volunteer spaces.

Another way to help Second Harvest is to bring in cans and packaged food for our market basket. For those who say "I just forgot", try this: On the Second Sunday of the month - think Second Harvest!! Whether you put some cans or packaged food in a sack near your door or stash you sack in your car, on the second Sunday – bring it in for the Second Harvest Food Bank.

Reflections from a Retired Pastor



What Do We **Expect of God?**

Much of the time spent in preaching by people like me seems to focus on what God expects from us. We hear it in the Biblical stories of God calling people. We believe God calls people as well known as Mother Theresa and Archbishop Desmond Tutu. On the list of those called but not well known are a friend who runs a soup kitchen in Maine and a friend who has been an administrator of aid programs in places like Afghanistan and The Sudan. We learn more about God's expectations in the 10 Commandments, the Two Great Commandments and the Sermon on the Mount. The list goes on.

However, with all that God expects of us, it is fair to ask, "What do we expect of God?" We don't usually think in terms of having expectations of God. After all, who are we, the created, to expect anything of God, the Creator?

But we do have expectations of God, and one place where I hear those expressed most clearly is in our prayers. You know how we pray. If we're pastors like me, we ask God publicly to solve the problems of the world in general (wars, floods, famines, etc.) and of our parishioners in particular every Sunday (a job, safe travel, healing). We do this because our people expect that we have "a direct line to God." That's probably why so many people used to speak to me just before I started worship about what they wanted me to ask God to remedy. Still, there are the other six days of the week when our individual prayers get offered to God by those of us who are not pastors.

What can we say when we're alone

with God? Books have been written to answer that question. When I was discussing prayer with our older son recently, knowing that he has a high stress job (he's a drug/alcohol addictions counselor), I suggested a prayer attributed to Richard Hooker (12th century). His prayer is as simple as it is profound: "O dear Lord, three things we pray: to see thee more clearly, to love thee more dearly, to follow thee more nearly." You may remember it from "Godspell."

I say that prayer every day. What am I expecting of God when I pray it? One way to express what I expect, or at least dare to hope for, is to say that I am asking God to draw me closer to God and to the work of God's kingdom.

It is not enough to ask God to fix all the things that are broken in our lives—even when the most broken thing is us or someone we love. I pray Richard Hooker's prayer and make it my own because I want to know God, to love God and to serve God. What good does it do to ask God for a list of "repairs" if we overlook the need to grow closer and more in love with God? I hesitate to say that I "expect" God to do this for me. Yet, I choose to believe that God does do this for me as rapidly as I am ready to accept it. I pray so that I won't forget that God wants to do this for me and for all of

He told them another parable: "The kingdom of heaven is like a mustard seed, which a man took and planted in his field. Though it is the smallest of all seeds, yet when it grows, it is the largest of garden plants and becomes a tree, so that the birds come and perch in its branches."
