

CIRCUIT "CELEBRATION" WORSHIP

By now you have heard that there will be no worship services, Sunday school classes or any church activity at Campbell UMC on Sunday, March 13th. There will be a gathering at Leigh High School of over a 1,000 local United Methodists to celebrate our beliefs and unity as Christians with Bishop Brown as the guest preacher. Having been involved in the planning stages from the beginning, I would like to explain how this tremendous event came about and why you should plan to be there.

In June, 2010, the District Superintendent, Kristie Olah, invited the pastors and lay members of the seven local United Methodist churches, fondly known as the Integrated Circuit, to a retreat in the Santa Cruz mountains. The mission of the retreat was to see if there were any common areas where the churches could collaborate and share their connectivity – besides the combined Charge Conferences. Some action items were listed and the lay leaders met again in September.

At this meeting, the action items were refined and it was agreed that members from individual church committees should meet. The first meeting was with the worship teams of the seven churches in October. Once again, the mission was to discuss possible areas of collaboration. I was present at this meeting and was struck

Pastor's **Point of** View



Part of what contributed to the success of Methodism right from the beginning was that it saw itself as a movement rather than a church. John Wesley wasn't interested in adding another split to the history of the church. He was interested in seeing people's lives changed and conditions in his society improved. The first Methodists were given the nickname Methodists because they were so careful in balancing prayer and Bible study on the one hand, and community action on the other. The movement was focused in personal and social change in the name of Jesus Christ.

On the American frontier, the Methodist movement was led by the Circuit Riders who rode around to different small towns and farms to preach and bring spiritual and social change. As well as planting the seeds of churches, they planted the seeds of hospitals and schools and many other institutions that brought positive social change.

Over the decades the Methodists have become much more institutional. We are now clearly a Christian church -one denomination among many, but I like to think that we can still reclaim our sense of being a movement.

We talk about being connectional. This means that we are part of a network across the nation and around the world, and we are all accountable to each other. We in Campbell are deeply concerned about what happens to congregations in Sierra Leone, in Cambodia, in Russia and in Brazil. We share spiritual values and trust each other, even though we may not speak each other's language. We invite others to join a movement that brings together people from all around the world singing one song of praise to God!

Many of us are saddened by the fact that we, as a congregation, are not paying our United Methodist apportionments in full. This means that we are not accepting our fair share of supporting the church regionally, nationally and internationally. Our spiritual DNA causes us to feel deep pain when we are not upholding our connectional commitment. We have trimmed our local church budget back to the essentials, and miraculously God has called individuals to step up and shoulder the work of ministry in this church, for which I say Thanks be to God!

Part of our connection is our new-found relationship with our circuit – the Integrated Circuit. We are eight congregations. On March 13th we will all be worshipping together at Leigh High School, and Bishop Warner Brown will be here to celebrate with us. Please make sure that you plan to be present, and bring all your friends and family. It will be a great day of celebrating what makes our movement great. The great thing about movements is that they move people, move institutions, and something new and beautiful is brought to life.

Inspired by successful high-speed train systems worldwide, California's electrically powered high-speed trains will help the state meet the ever growing demands of our state transportation infrastructure. With speeds of up to 220 mph, these trains can make the trip from San Francisco to Los Angles in 2 hours and 40 minutes.

You have plenty of time to prepare your kits, or assemble supplies for the warehouse. the Tanners and Hills are willing to save you shipping costs by taking your supplies with them. In alphabetical order the kits are:

Bedding kits Birthing kits Cleaning buckets Health kits Layette kits School kits Sewing kits Bulk materials.

In order to find out what is currently to be included in each kit look on the world wide web at UMCOR.org. Put your curser on the "how to give" box. Scroll down to "relief supplies" and click. Find the kit that you are interested in, put the cursor on the red "kit page" and click. You now have a list of the correct supplies that are needed for that kit. Please do NOT include any extra items. If you want to buy in bulk only one item requested for that kit, that is fine. All items must be new and have never been washed.

Most needed items at this time are: 1. hand towels 15"x25" to 16"x27" (no kitchen towels)

- 2. nail files or finger nail clippers (no toe nail clippers)
- 3. children's blunt scissors (no plastic blades)
- 4. hand held pencil sharpeners (minimum size 1 inch)

We will be collecting these items sometime in April in order to make certain that we have enough space to easily transport them.

UM Women - San Jose District

"It takes a 1000 positive comments to offset one negative comment" was the provocative presentation of Ann Bromnell at the Leadership and Membership Training Event of San Jose District United Methodist Women on Saturday, January 29th at Alum Rock United Methodist Church.

Amanda, Ann's daughter was bullied by a so-called friend over the internet when a junior in high school. After attempting suicide, she now lives in a near vegetative state. Ann has started the Amanda Network to stress the importance of bullying, most recently recognized as prevalent and of prime importance to all age levels. Her goal is to inform and direct action on combatting this serious negatism, centering the attention of women on this subject.

The key speaker, Lisa Jacobs, who has been the Director of the San Jose Youth Ministry for eight years, stressed the importance of developing contact with teenagers who are reluctant to approach those with more experience. Lisa - using Jesus as the example who "went to the people" - noted that teens live in a culture far different now than in the 90's, and need the opportunity to grow in direct, personal communication. Relationships are important, she stressed, and person-to-person contact without the presence of family should be the challenge of each United Methodist Women member. Programs do not accomplish what is desired, but personal experience shared with one teenager gives opportunity for individual input.

The 5 hour inspirational day also included a panel on the changes in mission from yesterday, today, and planned for coming days; nominations and voting for officers for the coming months until San Jose District becomes El Camino District; workshops for current officers; and a conversation during a substantial lunch served by Alum Rock UMW. The importance of all women having access to Response Magazine, New World Outlook, and San Jose District's Mission Link, was also stressed.

Reflections from a Retired Pastor



Explaining Faith to a 7 Year Old

I have always had great admiration for people who do teaching moments for children during worship and do them well. Why do I admire this talent so much? It's because I've done many teaching moments, and they haven't always worked out so well. Sometimes it was because I failed to understand just how complex a particular concept was. Try explaining why someone should be happy when they are "poor in spirit." The children don't get to the "spirit" part. They're stuck trying to understand why anyone would be happy if they were poor—if they understand what it means to be poor.

Why is this so important to me that I would devote a column to it? It's because I have always felt that if I/we couldn't explain our faith to a 7 year old child, then something important was missing. Why do I hold myself and others to such a high standard? It's because my faith was real to me by the time that I was 7 years old.

Perhaps some of you have had the experience that I had as a child. I grew up in an alcoholic and sometimes violent home. Yet, I was more than fortunate. I was blessed to have a priest and a nun (I was Catholic in those days) who taught me about Jesus. The three most important things they taught me about Jesus were these: 1) Jesus is a real person who is also God; 2) Jesus loves me; 3) Jesus comes to me in the sacrament of Holy Communion.

Perhaps those of you who have had a course in developmental psychology want to take me aside and remind me that a 7 year old child can't possibly understand abstractions like "God," "sacrament," "holy" or "communion." Indeed! Well, whatever my level of understanding at that point in my life was, of this

I am certain. Jesus was real enough to keep me coming back to worship and to Communion and to keep me as sane as I could be under the circumstances.

Do we still teach children the song. "Jesus Loves Me This I Know?" I didn't learn it until I was an adult going to a Congregational Church with Jane and our children. As a pastor I used to sing it with the children, especially when I led a separate Sunday School worship service with them. I wanted them to remember the song so they could remind themselves that, when all else was crumbling around them. Jesus loved them!

It is not easy for me to explain abstract concepts of faith, hope and charity. Sunday School teachers who do this well deserve special recognition. Perhaps their and our greatest asset in helping our children and young adults grow in faith is to make our own faith, hope and love more visible in the life of our church community as well as at home. That requires that we be willing to ask for and accept help in both educating our children about God's love for us and becoming more visibly people of faith, hope and love ourselves. Is that too much to ask? Ж

The people brought children to *Jesus, hoping he might touch them.* The disciples shooed them off. But Jesus was irate and let them know it: "Don't push these children away. Don't ever get between them and me. These children are at the very center of life in the kingdom. Mark this: Unless you accept God's kingdom in the simplicity of a child, you'll never get in. "Then, gathering the children up in his arms, he laid his hands of blessing on them.

Spiritual Stories

My Favorite Song

None of you have asked, so I'll tell you. My favorite hymn is: "I Love to Tell the Story" (UMC hymnal page 156). It was published in 1869 based on the poem "Tell Me the Old, Old Story" by Katherine Hankey.

I love to tell stories and none is better to tell than the one, in Hankey's words, of 'Jesus and his love." This is a song that I never get tired of singing and a story I never tire of telling.

I even like the story of how this hymn came to be:

Katherine (Kate) Hankey was born in London in 1834 and was a devout Christian and member of the Anglican Church and greatly influenced by John Wesley. She organized Sunday School class to teach children in the factories to read and write along with a good dose of Bible teaching. In her thirties she fell seriously ill and was confined to bed for over nine months. During this time she was unable to teach. It was during this illness that Hankey wrote a long poem, "Tell Me the Old, Old Story." The poem was first published in 1866 and several different versions were published in the next few years. The hymn was taken from the second half of the poem and set to music by William Fischer in 1869. Her need to tell the story couldn't be contained by illness.

Hankey recovered and continued her teaching and severed as a missionary in Africa.

by the enthusiasm and ideas that were generated. By the end of this meeting, it was decided to investigate the possibility of a combined Integrated Circuit Sunday service. The spirit was alive in that room. At the next meeting of the Worship teams, a Saturday workshop had been added to the Sunday worship and the scope of the event was now starting to take shape. It was decided to seek a venue that was central to the seven congregations, had adequate facilities and could seat the estimated one thousand worshippers. References were made to the Wesley hymn, "O! For a Thousand Tongues to Sing!"

By early January, Marcia McFee, the widely respected author, worship designer, professor, preacher and artist had been secured to lead the Saturday Workshop and assist in the Sunday Worship preparation. This was a major step for the program. Marcia McFee has been the worship consultant for a number of United Methodist Annual Conferences including last year's Northern California/Nevada Annual Conference and the General Conference International Gathering in 2008.

When Bishop Brown heard of the plans, he asked if he could lead the celebration of the eight churches, which now included the New Creation congregation.

After surveying a number of facilities, the pastors found an available (and affordable) venue in Leigh High School. The Lay Leaders went about organizing the event logistics, while the worship team prepared for the workshop and service. Thank you to everyone who has volunteered to help. The final touches are now being added so the eight local United Methodist churches of the 'Integrated Circuit' can join in one Sunday worship. Much planning and effort have gone into this event. You are strongly encouraged to come together with fellow United Methodists to express our unity and connectivity as Christians and of course to be one of the Thousand Tongues To Sing!
