In 1890, the Reverend T.B. Hopkins was appointed minister for the Campbell-Saratoga area. A Board of Trustees, elected at the first quarterly conference, secured a suitable lot for the church on the north side of Campbell Avenue between Central Avenue and First Street. A one and a half story frame building was built with Gothic windows, a tall steeple, a bell tower, and a basement where Sunday School classes and fellowship events were held. It was dedicated on April 30, 1891. The total cost for the church and lot was \$3,180. This was the first of the three Sanctuaries built for the First Methodist Church of Campbell.

Nine people (7 adults, 2 children) from Campbell UMC recently attended what SHN calls a "Demonstration Event" held at Los Gatos UMC. We talked with SHN's founder, heard of its plans for the Bay Area and participated in the packaging of 2,000 meals!

We left committed to having Campbell UMC sponsor a 1-day Packaging Event at which we will pay for and package 10,000 meals! Details are yet to be worked out but here's the key information:



PRAYER FLAGS FLY AT ELMWOOD!

Simple, Meaningful, Powerful, Beautiful

The Campbell United Methodist Church (CUMC) Art and Spirit Ministry team recently worked with both minimum and medium security women at the Elmwood Women's Correctional Facility creating prayer flags together. The team made extensive preparations, met at the jail for three consecutive sessions in each unit, and then





inside the medium security unit. The team participated in worship with 84 women at the jail, gave a blessing after the flags were hung and dedicated the flags in medium security. These were very powerful and moving experiences for the women of Elmwood, as well as for our team.

The process was truly amazing grace! Not only did we feel the Spirit of

hope, compassion and love in these meetings, but the administration at Elmwood supported the program and allowed the flags to be hung inside the jail -- a first! An officer in medium security also wrote:

"Today was the first day of a three day series for the "Art and Spirit" program run by the Chaplaincy group. The class was held in the day room of W4B, beginning at 0900 hours and ending at approximately 1100 hours. Today's class consisted of prayer,

painting and creating prayer flags, sharing among the inmates and songs/singing. Chaplain Louann was present during the class along with four volunteers that worked with the inmates. The class is currently offered only to inmates in purple group, is completely voluntary and 30 of the inmates in purple group participated in today's class. The class ran very smoothly without any issues and the inmates appeared to really enjoy the class and were very appreciative of the



class and the instructors. The class will be held the next two Fridays during the same time block. If the class is successful for the next two weeks, I would like to respectfully suggest that we offer the program to the inmates in Green group also. Some of the girls have already expressed an interest in participating."

Making prayer flags is a way to reconnect with spirit and creativity. It is also a way to become a positive spiritual force in the world -- no matter what a person's situation or circumstance is.

To me there are few things more beautiful than colorful prayer flags fluttering in the windsometimes waving gently, sometimes raging; a dance of shadow and light. There is perhaps no simpler way to create good merit in this troubled world of ours than to put prayer flags up for the benefit of other living beings. Prayer flags are not just pretty pieces of colored cloth with funny



writing on them. The ancient Buddhist prayers, mantras and powerful symbols displayed on them produce a spiritual vibration that is activated and carried by the wind across the countryside. All beings that are touched by the wind are uplifted and a little happier. The silent prayers are blessings spoken on the breath of nature. Just as a drop of water can permeate the ocean, prayers dissolved in the wind extend to fill all of space.

Matthew 19:14: "Let the children alone, don't prevent them from coming to me. God's kingdom is made up of people like these."

Isaiah 58:10: "If you are generous with the hungry and start giving yourselves to the down-and-out, your lives will begin to glow in the darkness, your shadowed lives will be bathed in sunlight."

By the time you read this, school will have been in session for about a month with many hungry children in attendance. The Healthy Snack Program that ran from March to June was very successful with many positive comments from students, teachers and office staff.

Church & Society would like to sponsor the program again with a goal of feeding the children the entire school year. We NEED your help to accomplish this. Thank you to those who have signed up as volunteers already and to those who have generously donated money to buy the snacks.

The snacks will be served on Tuesday and Thursday mornings at recess. There are two recesses, so the time commitment would be from 10:00 a.m.-11:00a.m. There needs to be 2 volunteers each day.

The cost of the snack provided is approximately \$100 per week. We have served up to 200 children each day.

A River Flowing Into Our Souls Rev. Larry LaPierre

Many of us know what it's like to "have more on our plate" than we can handle. I first heard that expression in my second parish. A four-year-old boy had been disruptive during the Sunday worship service, and some people complained about "Matthew." The Lay Leader brought the concern to me, but to my surprise she did not recommend trying to do anything directly about the child. She said, "Alice," (Matthew's mother) "has more on her plate than she can manage." In fact, she did, and we decided that it was up to the church to support the mother in coping with a dysfunctional situation. They did.

However, not everyone has a supporter like that Lay Leader. Not everyone has a congregation to back them up either. I used to try to make sense of that reality for the veterans with whom I served as a chaplain at the VA hospital in Vermont. Many of them had been traumatized in several ways—even prior to war. As a result of their traumas, many of them were not easy to live with. In fact, many of them had been divorced several times. Some were guite antisocial. They needed a way to begin to make sense of what was happening to them and how they could respond more lovingly.

I used to draw a diagram of a mountain on the chalk board. Half way down the mountain I would draw a lake. The only other details that I added were a river flowing into the lake from higher up the mountain and a second river that flowed out of the lake and down its slope.

Then I would ask them a question: "What happens to the lake if the amount of water flowing out is greater than the amount flowing in?" I would assure them that it was not a trick question. The obvious answer is, "The lake eventually goes dry."

Yes, and so do we. The mountain is a word picture for where and how we

experience God with us ("Emmanuel"). It's nearly impossible to avoid the forces that drain the lake which is our soul/spirit. Sickness, loss of a job, conflict at home or work, ageing or caring for ageing parents, addictive behaviors and many other factors drain us to the point of despair or death. We are so busy trying to cope with the outflow from the lake that we hardly pay attention to the river flowing into our souls/spirits.

The river that flows into us, to use a Wesleyan term, begins with "Prevenient Grace." It is literally grace that "comes before" (pre: "before;" venir: "to come;" Latin) we are even aware of God or of the river of grace flowing from God to us. Having given us this grace, God expects us to respond. How? Ideally, we respond by accepting this gift of God's self to us particularly in the life and personhood of Jesus. But this acceptance of God's gift has to be an ongoing process. The lake must continue to be filled every day by spiritual disciplines that we use to open our souls to the river of grace waiting to fill us. I will write more about these spiritual disciplines.

Teaching/Facilitating Disciple Bible Study

"What makes me qualified to teach Disciple classes and/or the Bible?" you might be asking. "Where have I had my training to take on such a task?" Well, here's a little information about my background in Bible study and how I arrived at this stage of my learning and teaching.

I graduated from a Christian college in 1962 with a BA in Religion, my goal being to become a minister. As often happens in college, my aspirations changed over the course of my studies and although I graduated with a degree, I went on to a secular college, eventually graduating with a couple of Masters Degrees in English Literature

and Library Science in 1974. All through college I continued to read and study the Bible, attending various churches, looking for the one I felt could meet my needs.

In 2000 I "discovered" this Methodist church and began to attend regularly. I met many wonderful and dedicated Christians at this church including the ministers Dick and Bobbie Corson and Cheryl Olson, the Director of Christian education. It was through Cheryl I began to attend Disciple classes, eventually completing the four that were offered as well as other classes taught by Cheryl. I found it to be a stimulating and exciting experience, not only meeting new people and listening to their understanding of what was being studied but learning from Cheryl teaching. After several years, Cheryl asked me if I wanted to try teaching a class myself. I was hesitant because I questioned my ability but Cheryl encouraged me, arranging training for me and other interested people. This training provided me with a good understanding of how to approach this task.

After Cheryl passed away and time went on in the life of the church, I felt a calling to share my love of the scriptures through the Disciple study program. It has been a rich, rewarding experience and has blessed me in many ways. As most teachers will tell you, teaching is a two-way process, we learn as much from the students as they learn from us.

There is a wonderful story in Acts 8:26-40 about the Disciple Philip who encounters an Ethiopian sitting in a chariot reading from the book of Isaiah. "Do you understand what you are reading," Philip asked and the Ethiopian answered: "How can I unless someone guides me." That passage speaks volumes to me; how can we understand unless someone guides us. That is what effective sermons and in depth Bible study will provide for us, an understanding of God's word.




